

Shelter



Goals and Concept (Before & After the Renovation)

Decolonizing while understanding the history.

The building was built in 1925, and it has historically operated commerical functions such as a restaurant, a bank, and most recently, a hair salon. It is unknown, but the building was divided into two different sections with different tenants.

The building utilizes the architectural style that was a national trend after the World War I, which was the neoclassical architectural style. Some decorative elements of the architectural style can be seen on the exterior of the building. For example, on the top corners of the building. there are carved classical figures and classical crown molding, as well as an ancient greek column located on the exterior of the building. Although it was challenging to transform this eurocentric architectural design into a diverse thai cusine venue, I took it as an opportunity to transform the old history into the new diverse and inclusive Syracuse area.


Limited Access to the Building

The site is located on W Fayette St, and before the renovation, there were numerous amount of ADA Violations found within the building, which limits access.

For example, the rear side of the building, which had ramps was not accessible as the panic doors were not functioning. This was a ADA Violation, as well as a fire code violation. Even with the doors functioning, the doors were too wide that the passageway was not wide enough for wheelchair users entering and exiting the building. Rear side of the building is occupied by a different building, and currently is being utilized as a parking lot. I have reimagined the rear side as a loading and staff parking. Front of the building provides accessible street parking, which can be seen in the renderings.

How did I Apply Biophilia?

Using the shape of leaves that protects snowberry from the harsh sunlights, I used the shapes as part of the window treatment. Between the exterior and the interior window, 3D shapes of the snowberry leaves were placed to provide soft sun protection.



Mobility Modules respond to current and future mobility demands. They include shared services and units that promote active travel and electric transport, facilitating interchange.












